Community-Based Water Monitoring



We conducted low and high flow monitoring at Coal, Lizard, Alexander, and Boivin Creeks with the help of 10 Streamkeepers and 23 volunteers. In 2020 we will continue low flow monitoring on previously monitored creeks with the addition of Morrissey Creek. Funding permitted we will expand to include monthly monitoring to address specific issues within the watershed and temperature logging to help monitor temperature changes in fish bearing streams. In response to community concerns. а sedimentation study is planned for Coal Creek focusing on logging impacts.

Shoreline Cleanup



Despite the snowy weather, this year's cleanup saw an incredible turnout both on the day of and for succeeding days after from various Elk Valley schools conducting their own mini river cleanups, removing refuse and invasive plant species from key locations in the watershed. This year cigarette butts and single use plastics continued to be top offenders. In the spring of 2020, we will be rallying students again to hit the shoreline and remove additional garbage and invasive plants.

Hosmer Beavers




We worked with community volunteers to fence several large cottonwood trees to discourage felling by beavers, and have assessed the site for further mitigation measures. We will be working with residents to monitor beaver activity along the creek, preparing to take action should beavers move in, and will be fencing more trees in the summer.

Stormwat Solutions



We completed one full day workshop for better stormwater management and one evening presentation covering the basics of rainwater capture. We worked with Fernie Secondary Students to conduct a cleanup of items being washed into our rivers and streams stormwater, completed through wetland plantings with Fernie Academy students, and installed two rain gardens complete with interpretive signs at the Eco-Garden and Fernie Family Garden. We are seeking funding to expand the project further in 2020 for greater education and stewardship opportunities.

Weeds Out of our Wetlands



With the help of many dedicated community volunteers and some hardworking students from FJM Elementary School, we completed our final year of this project. We conducted three weedpulls throughout the summer months, removed the tarps and weed barrier that were shading out the reed canary grass, planted over 300 native plants in the wetland, seeded the area with native grass seed and put up an exclusion fence to discourage foraging. In 2020 we will monitor the survival rates and vegetation growth in the wetland.
